

CREMA CATALANA

This classic dessert is a must-try for anyone exploring the rich culinary heritage of Spain.





Escalivada

Escalivada is a traditional Catalan dish that celebrates the simplicity and flavors of roasted vegetables. The name comes from the Catalan word escalivar, meaning "to cook in ashes," reflecting its origins in rustic, fire-roasted preparation. Typically made with eggplant, red peppers, onions, and tomatoes, the vegetables are charred until tender, then peeled and sliced into strips. They are often drizzled with olive oil, seasoned with salt, and sometimes garnished with garlic or anchovies for extra flavor

BOMBAS

Bombas are a beloved Spanish tapa originating from Barcelona, known for their flavorful combination of crispy and savory elements. These potato croquettes are shaped like small bombs, stuffed with a spicy meat filling, and deep-fried to golden perfection. They are traditionally served with two contrasting sauces: a rich, garlicky aioli and a bold, spicy brava sauce, symbolizing a culinary "explosion" of flavors. Popular in Catalan bars and restaurants, bombas are a must-try for anyone seeking a taste of Barcelona's vibrant tapas culture.





Casa Batlló






BOCADILLO DE CALAMARES

El Retiro Park






Moyúa






Alcazaba




CORDOBA



Mosque-Cathedral




